

Wingello Fire Brigade News

September was another busy month for your brigade. A local property owner conducted an illegal pile burn that kept reigniting. It required the brigade to pump nearly 24,000 litres of water to achieve extinguishment!

A 2012 model Toyota vehicle stolen from Marulan was set alight on Sydney St and the early morning call-out saw the brigade arrive with the vehicle totally gutted. Police enquiries are continuing.

Brigade members have assisted in two out of area hazard reduction burns. One of them was at the Holsworthy Small Bore Rifle Range where our guys were constantly 'under fire' with unspent shells exploding moments after the bush had been lit up. The second was at Joadja near Bullio on Wombeyan Caves Rd. There are a couple of local burns planned during October.

October is the start of the statutory Bushfire **Danger Period** (BFDP) during which no fires can be lit without a Fire Permit. The Permits are available from the brigade Captain. The current prediction for the BFDP is for a challenging season mainly due to the incredible growth of grass fuels that have not been seen for some 35 years. We encourage all members of the community to ensure that they have properly prepared their properties and have developed their Bushfire Survival Plan (BFSP). The BFSP is available from the brigade.

Our 'FireFlies' Dinner Dance was held on the 8th and again was a great night enjoyed by all. It is pleasing to see the increased support for this function from members of our great community.
